Grandmother sends Little Grey out into the woodland world to ask the birds and the trees, the stream and the moon - and finally, his own heart. Little Grey discovers that there is love at the heart of all creation and, although creation is earthbound, that love lifts it mysteriously to heaven.

This story sparkles - on one level a sweet and simple story of a woodland animal, yet conveying a message of delight in the world around, with reverence for the mystery and the heart of things and with trust in the creator's love.

I Saw the Lord**By Anne Graham Lotz Hodders, £8.99**

In the immediate aftermath of the 9/11 terrorist attacks, Anne Graham Lotz was asked for a message of hope and faith for the American nation. What she said led to an invitation to deliver a similar message to over 600 British MPs and leaders at the House of Commons.

I SAW THE LORD publishes her address for the first time and digs deeper into the message that she believes is the most important prophecy God has ever given her.

Based on Isaiah 1-6, it is a wake-up call for all Christians living in a world more divided and insecure than ever before. Only God can understand our deepest fears and needs. As individuals and as a nation, we need a passionate rediscovery of Jesus and the call he makes on our lives.

Anne explains with sensitivity and brilliant biblical insight, what it really means to see Jesus, and how he can change our lives at the deepest level.

This dramatic call to revival will be highly publicised both in the UK and USA, and will demand a profound response from the Church and Christians everywhere.

Edward Stourton unravels John Paul's life, his beliefs, his actions and ultimately places him in context within the Catholic Church of the 20th and 21st Century.
