We have faced the unexpected, and deeply sad, loss of a staff member, the retirement of another, as well as celebrated a new baby in the family of a team member.

We have seen God provide for two of our special needs children in Shalom, to attend the best schools in town, and others at the home thrive in the school they attend down the road from their home.

As we look, in 2017, at taking the model of what we have been doing for orphaned and vulnerable children in our community to other churches across Zimbabwe; we are confident that many more children will be taken in and cared for through pre-schools, day care centers and loving families by adoption and foster care.

We are excited to see our team grow with the addition of Simba and Barbara Pfupajena, a wonderful couple who will be taking on much of the Michael Project's day to day operations, co-ordination and management. Simba and Barbara adopted their daughter two years ago with help from the Michael Project and have a passion and heart for orphaned and vulnerable children. We look forward with great excitement for what God has in store for The Michael Project in 2017.

### LOCAL ADOPTION BELIEFS

ZIMBABWEANS have adopted children since time immemorial, but this has tended to be done informally within communities and between families. It is very common for children to be raised by parents who are not their biological parents, so it is not a foreign practice.

However, due to fear and ignorance, legal adoption tends to unnerve many people who then discourage other people, who may be open to it. They invariably tell horror tales of unknown spirits descending upon the adopted child later on in life.

The story is always the same with minor variations. The totem-less child always runs amok one day smashing the fine china and tearing the curtains in a demonic frenzy demanding to be returned to his or her people. These spirits punish the adoptive parents for having "taken" a child who was not theirs and they cause all sorts of misfortune and havoc just to put their point across.

# SHALOM — A HAVEN FOR CHILDREN



OFF TO SCHOOL

Sixteen children live at Shalom. The home is divided into three family units with the children growing up in a healthy environment where they experience the care of loving parents, the community and of God.

Incredible opportunities have been given to one of our Shalom kids who attends a special needs senior school and now experiences horse-riding and golf as part of his weekly curriculum.

Three of the children also received awards from their school at the end of the year, being

- Most improved student and a certificate for neatness and a good attitude.
- Worker of the year.
- 1st place in grade 4.



We have been so heartened by the continued commitment of a father who maintains contact with his children, visiting them at Shalom, and bringing gifts when he can. After tragically losing his wife, and the mother of his 3 children in childbirth, he voluntarily opted, due to extremely tough circumstances, to have his children placed and cared for at Shalom. What a selfless act of a father wanting the best for his children.

#### PRESCHOOLS TRANSFORMING LIVES



The Michael Project runs three preschools, in Wingate, Greystone Park and Chikurubi Female Prison. We also run a day care center for babies.

When Vimbai (not her real name) enrolled at Wingate Preschool, she was malnourished, sickly and missed many days of school.

During home visits our teachers found Vimbai's mother to be a closed off and bitter woman disillusioned by the harshness of life. After many visits and prayers Vimbai's mom finally opened up and revealed that she and her daughter were HIV positive and struggling to cope.

With support and encouragement from the teachers, mom and daughter sought treatment at a nearby clinic.

Vimbai is now 6 years old and thriving by the grace of God through the loving intervention of her teachers

Sheila began teaching the Shalom toddlers in the home and then moved across to work in the nursery classroom


at our Chikurubi Day Care Centre.
