British Library

By the Revd Peter Crumpler, a Church of England priest in St Albans, Herts, and a former communications director for the Church of England.

A time to stand up for truth?

An important exhibition is running at the British Library in London until August 21st. It's an exhibition taking a timely look at the news and the role it plays in our society. I'd love many Christians to visit it.

It comes as 'the news' has never been more contentious and, sadly, the public's trust in journalists – in the UK and around the world – remains low. Yet the increasing persecution of journalists by totalitarian states across the globe shows the importance of a free press to the flourishing of democracy.

As Christians, we have a special calling to stand up for truth and, I believe, to support journalists and news organisations seeking to communicate that truth – often in the face of violence, threats and murder.

I've been involved in a project, based in the Anglican Diocese of St Albans, north of London, for the past several years, looking at post-truth, fake news and disinformation. We have brought together a wide group of people to examine issues around post-truth, and to help to formulate a Christian response.

Key findings include the importance of keeping conversations going including with people with whom we disagree, being willing to ask questions about what we are being told, and to refuse to succumb to cynicism. Most importantly, to stand for truth in a climate of mounting disinformation.

So I welcome the exhibition, 'Breaking the News', the British Library's first major exhibition to spotlight the role news plays in our society. The exhibition aims to prompt big questions including:

How do your opinions and beliefs influence the news you choose? When does news become propaganda? Why do we devour crime stories and sensationalism?

Who decides which stories to suppress and which to spotlight?

At a time when the global trustworthiness of journalists ranks at just 23 per cent – with only bankers, business leaders, advertisers, government ministers and politicians ranking beneath them – it's time for Christians and all people of faith and goodwill to look at how we receive our news, and how we view it.

Making a visit to this high-profile exhibition could be the first step in reevaluating the importance of reliable news sources and the role Christians could play in supporting diverse and trustworthy media. Garvin loves to observe and interact with animals and wildlife, and has many stories to share. He has kindly started to write some of them down for the Key, so the first two are included here. We both encourage you to contribute if you have your own interests and experiences that you'd like to share! Many thanks Garvin for spending time on this.

PET COMPETITION

In 1982 I began as Rooms Manager and continued for 25 years.

The winner, unexpectedly, was a young boy who presented his pet frog.

I asked Susan what additional information that the boy had offered above the numerous competitors. And she said that he was the only boy that knew the detailed ailments of his pet and how to alleviate unwanted symptoms.

AYLESFORD PRIORY (Maidstone) THE DUCK

Last Year Julia D and I travelled to Aylesford Priory, near Maidstone in Kent.

It is a large monastery established by Carmelite Friars several centuries ago.

It is peaceful and includes several small Churches linked near a large lake which surrounds a small Island of different wild birds.

Twice a year several thousand Christians descend to the estate for spiritual guidance, help and care. When I went to such a special festival, unexpectedly The Archbishop of Canterbury also visited, also I had encouraged several young Christian members of our Church to attend. The place is certainly worth a visit!

Julia D & I recently visited the site for 3 Days with excellent independent accommodation, excellent food and a beautiful environment.

We spent hours enjoying the company & the rich diversity of wild birds and animals on the estate, which also surrounded the great lake.

Also, while we were there, we particularly enjoyed the 4-course meals in the 'Pilgrim hall' dining area. Nothing was too much to trouble for a specialist diet. The friars (Roman Catholic) were wonderful hosts.

Unexpectedly while enjoying the dinner, the retired Bishop of Rochester joined us with a lady, with a dog collar, who was evidently leading 100 lay ministry persons who joined us later for a meal and further training courses.

I was questioned if I knew any of the past priests and I answered that I knew all of her colleagues, including the Rev. Sophie Sutherland.

Watching the wildlife around the lake later was a pleasure! But we noticed a very sad white duck that had followed my several hundred yards walk around the lake. And the duck stopped walking only a few feet away and looked up into my eyes. Subsequently Julia & I asked at the office if the duck was unwell.

Julia & I had decided that we could help the duck, but the office said that we must ask the Prior of the Monastery if we could be of help. For there were several mother coots calling and teaching their 10 black balls of fluff, their Babies, to swim. Also hundreds of geese and 2 black swans needing attention.

A letter was sent to the Prior, who responded with a wonderful reply to both of us indicating that the white duck had recently lost his partner by a savage fox and had been sad for several months.

However, unexpected 'grateful thanks' were offered to us.

The Prior indicated that there was no need to purchase or seek medical advice for the white duck, as the Abbey had been given not only one but TWO white ducks to befriend the original sad duck. Evidently, they all now follow each other, happily on numerous walks together around the lake. Also, no payment was required.

Can you Imagine how thankful we both were!?

Sadly, Julia passed away shortly after the visit, but thoroughly enjoyed our encounter with the white duck and local wildlife.

Later this year I hope to visit Aylesford Priory and speak again to the white duck and his friends and personally to the Prior.

Was this a GOD INCEDENT? For I believe that it was.

16th June Richard of Chichester, wanting God more clearly, dearly and nearly

Ever wonder where the prayer ... 'May I know thee more clearly, love thee more dearly, and follow thee more nearly, day by day' comes from? Richard of Chichester, a bishop in the 13th century, wrote it.

He began life as Richard de Wych of Droitwich, the son of a yeoman farmer. But Richard was a studious boy, and after helping his father on the farm for several years, refused an advantageous offer of marriage, and instead made his way to Oxford, and later to Paris and Bologna to study canon law.

In 1235 he returned to Oxford, and was soon appointed Chancellor, where he supported Edmund, Archbishop of Canterbury, in his struggles against King Henry III's misuse of Church funds. After further study to become a priest, Richard was in due course made a bishop himself. He was greatly loved. He was charitable and accessible, both stern and merciful to sinners, extraordinarily generous to those stricken by famine, and a brilliant legislator of his diocese. He decreed that the sacraments were to be administered without payment, Mass celebrated in dignified conditions, the clergy to be chaste, to practise residence, and to wear clerical dress. The laity was obliged to attend Mass on Sundays and holy days, and to know by heart the Hail Mary as well as the Lord's Prayer and the Creed.

Richard was also prominent in preaching the Crusade, which he saw as a call to reopen the Holy Land to pilgrims, not as a political expedition. He died at Dover on 3rd April 1253. In art, Richard of Chichester is represented with a chalice at his feet, in memory of his having once dropped the chalice at Mass! One ancient English church is dedicated to him.

And, of course, he is author of that famous prayer, now set to popular music, which runs in full: "Thanks be to thee, my Lord Jesus Christ for all the benefits thou hast given me, for all the pains and insults which thou hast borne for me. O most merciful redeemer, friend and brother, may I know thee more clearly, love thee more dearly and follow thee more nearly, day by day."

Enid Knight

Many of you will know the lovely Enid Knight, who sadly passed away recently. David has kindly provided the eulogy for Enid for us to read and remember her. Our thoughts and prayers are with you David, and your family.

Enid was born in Hastings on the 9th July 1943 and spent the first six years of life living in the town. From the time she was knee high to the table she wanted to be a nurse and spent time bandaging he dolls to make them better. Enid's father taught maths at secondary school and on taking up a new appointment the family moved from Hastings to Pettswood, then to Bromley when Enid was fifteen. Enid was a very keen guider and already a Patrol Leader in Pettswood and she came to the Bromley Parish Church and joined the Guide company here run by Pat Powell. In a very short time she became Company Leader with the three stripes on her left breast pocket. So began her sixty four year association with this church, which was to her, very much her soul church.

Enid was in the founding class of the of Orpington Grammar School and it was there that she obtained the requisite GCE's that would take her into nursing. Enid had the opportunity to train in one of the London teaching hospital but chose instead to train locally at Bromley Hospital. Having completed her training she sat her hospital and state finals and became a State Registered Nurse. Of this qualification she was very proud.

Enid trained to be a nurse in the early 1960's, and most nurses would obtain their State Registry and then do the Midwifery course but that didn't interest Enid at all. Enid chose to do "Casualty" instead. I can remember her colleagues saying "what do you want to do, "Casualty" for it's a Cinderella job, a back water." The leading hospital running "Casualty" courses at that time was the Birmingham Accident Hospital, Enid applied and was accepted. But then a handsome young debonair policeman had arrived on the scene, hurriedly courses were rearranged and she took her



Casualty course at St. Nicholas Hospital in Plumstead. Enid completed her Casualty course by doing twelve months theatre training, back at Bromley Hospital. "Casualty" took off and became the specialisation we today know as Accident and Emergency and Enid was to do well over twenty years in A & E at Bromley as a Senior Staff nurse. Enid always said that when the doors of the A and E department opened you never knew what was coming in, a child with a bead stuck up its nose, a carpenter who had driven a chisel into his hand or you could be fighting for some ones life.

On the 8th July 1966, Enid's birthday, at 2-30pm Enid and I were married here by our dear friend Alan Mccabe. Enid always said that I was the best birthday present she ever had but then she always had an appreciation of quality when she saw it.

Encouraged first by Michael Beek and then Peter Lock, Enid studied to become Reader. A ministry she carried out at Bromley Parish Church for over twenty years. At Tim Mercers request, Enid also became part of the Hospital Chaplancy Team at the PRUH, a ministry that was to last over ten years.

Enid has taught Sunday school here, made cups of tea here, done Saturday mornings here with her long term Saturday partner, of blessed memory, Roger Butler, baked cakes, made flans, arranged Pass over meals, and helped to get Summer School up and running, arranged flowers and acted as a sure, reliable, sympathetic support to those who needed her help over the years.

If I were to put up an epitaph for Enid it would read, "She tried to ease peoples pain and suffering and heal them" not a bad Epitaph that for the dedicated nursing life she lead.

God has always been more than generous to me, more than I have ever deserved, but the greatest blessing he ever bestowed on me was Enid Mary Jackson as my wife. Thank you Father, for giving me the privilege and honour of caring for the only angel this side of paradise for the last 55 years.

Rest in Christ's peace my Darlingmost girl and may you rise in glory. God bless you.

Many of you took part in the 'Walk to Harare', raising money for our partner Church in Zimbabwe. Ed has kindly provided the update below on their current situation. Many thanks to Ed for your work in keeping this connection going and in keeping us all updated.

Due to corruption and mismanagement of the economy, life has been hard for people in Zimbabwe. The Zimbabwean currency has continually been devalued. Hyperinflation meant that banknotes were printed with \$100 trillion banknote being used. New Zimbabwean dollars were introduced to combat this problem. Eventually, the country stopped issuing its own currency and used a variety of foreign currencies for a while before introducing a new Zimbabwean dollar in 2019. This was originally equal in value to the American dollar, but

now is only worth 0.003 US dollars. To make matters worse, much trade was informal from small stalls in the street; these were closed by the government when Covid-19 hit the country.

Despite the state of the economy, unknown millions of US dollars were spent on the erection of a huge statue to the spirit medium Mbuya Nehanda in central Harare on 25 May 2021 (Africa Day) - amid the collapse of the health system and economic chaos. Not only is this an inappropriate expenditure during the Covid emergency, but also a worrying event in a supposedly Christian country.

St. Paul's church is in a poor district of the capital Harare.

They do their best to help the community by providing food and medicines. It costs between £20 and £25 to provide a package of food and soap to help a family for month. Our church has tried to assist them with this and last year Rev James initiated a 'Walk to Harare' campaign. The idea was that the congregation, between them, would walk the 12,000km from our church to St Pauls to raise money. This was successful and the money gratefully received and hampers quickly distributed to the community.

Covid-19 had a major impact on the country. Due to the government embracing China, it initially refused free offers of western vaccines and would only accept Chinese vaccines. The people distrusted these vaccines so take up was low. Due to the collapse of the health system, statistics on the impact of Covid are unreliable, though we can hope that the open air living style may have helped lower the infection rate. Churches were closed for a while, but re-opened to vaccinated people in September 2021. However, with so few people vaccinated, only 69 people attended compared with a typical 600 to 800.

Attendance has now picked up. Rev. Chris was finally inducted in April after 2 years as their vicar. The service reminded me of Rev. James' induction complete with ringing the bell.

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



























Prayers and poems
