

Sermon

March 2024

Many thanks to the Reverend Valerie Pearce for providing us with this month's sermon from the second Sunday of Epiphany

Bible readings:

I Samuel 3:1-10 (Revelation 5: 1-10)

John 1:43-end

France has a new Prime Minister, who's very young, known to be gay and said to be a very good communicator. It is hoped by some that he will be the person to save France from extremist politics, but I wonder how the average French citizen is reacting to him? Some may be swept along by his rhetoric, and quickly sign up to follow him, others may be more cautious, standing back and waiting to find out more about him.

It's always been the same with regard to Jesus, both at that time and on through history. Some have been quick to respond and follow him, while others have taken their time and held back, wanting to find out more before they would commit.

It seems that Nathanael, whom we heard about in the Gospel reading today, was very much in the latter camp and took some persuading and encouraging to even approach Jesus.

We don't know much about Nathanael. Besides this story, we know only that he was privileged to see the risen Christ and it is thought that he became one of the disciples, and was the same person as Bartholomew. In this first encounter with Nathanael, Jesus said, "Because I told you, 'I saw you underneath the fig tree,' do you believe? You will see greater things than these!" (v. 50). In other words, "You ain't seen nothin' yet!"

"Most certainly, I tell you, hereafter, you will see heaven opened, and the angels of God ascending and descending on the Son of Man" (v. 51). That might seem like strange language to you, but it would not have been strange to Nathanael--not at all.

Way back in the beginnings of the Jewish people, God made a covenant with Abraham. God promised to make a great nation of Abraham's descendants

and to bless the whole world through him (Genesis 12:1-3). Then later, God renewed that covenant through Jacob--Abraham's grandson. God gave Jacob a vision--a vision of angels ascending and descending on a ladder from heaven to earth (Genesis 28:10-22). There's an old camp song about that-"We are climbing Jacob's ladder"--you may have heard it.

A ladder from heaven might seem like strange to us, but Jacob understood it. He knew that the ladder meant that the heavens, where it was believed God dwelled, had broken open so that God could visit earth. Jacob named the place Bethel, which means, "dwelling place of God."

When Jesus told Nathanael that he would see angels ascending and descending, Nathanael would think immediately of Jacob's ladder. Nathanael would know that Jesus was promising that, just as Jacob experienced God's presence, so Nathanael would also experience God's presence.

But there's an odd thing about this story. In the original Greek:

When Jesus says, "You will see greater things than these!" he uses "you" singular, indicating that he is talking to Nathanael.

However, when he says, "You will see heaven opened, and the angels of God ascending and descending on the Son of Man," Jesus uses "you" plural.

In other words, Jesus was talking to Nathanael, but then he began to talk to the disciples--to all disciples--even to us. It's not just Nathanael, but all of us who will see great things--heaven opened--angels ascending and descending --the treasure-house of God spilled out upon the earth.

And indeed that happened in so many different ways. After the resurrection, the disciples gathered at Jerusalem on the Day of Pentecost. There, amidst tongues of fire and sounds of a windstorm, Peter preached and three thousand people walked down the aisle to be baptized. It was an amazing day! 'Heaven opened'! 'Angels of God ascending and descending'!

And then a crippled beggar asked Peter for alms. Peter said, "Silver and gold have I none, but what I have, that I give you. In the name of Jesus Christ of

Nazareth, get up and walk!" (Acts 3:6). And the man got up and started walking. He would walk a little bit--and then he was so excited that he would jump --and then he would praise God! "He entered...into the temple, walking, leaping, and praising God!" (Acts 3:8). Amazing! 'Heaven opened'! 'Angels of God ascending and descending'!

And then Saul went to Damascus to persecute Christians, but Jesus blinded him with a great light--and dropped him to his knees--and Saul became Paul, the great Christian missionary (Acts 9:1-22). How amazing! 'Heaven opened'! 'Angels of God ascending and descending'!

You might say, That's all well and good, but it was two thousand years ago. We haven't seen the heaven opened or angels coming down for a long time now.

But we have! The heavens that opened when Jesus came have been open ever since. Some people couldn't see it while Jesus was here on earth, and some still can't. But eyes of faith see wondrous things happen all the time. 'Heaven opened'! 'Angels of God ascending and descending'!

The world isn't always kind and gentle. There are terrible wars: between Israel and Gaza, in Ukraine, in Yemen, Sudan, and there are many places in the world today that have brutal and inhumane systems, acking in real justice. And in our own country, while many of us have been aware of it, we've had a terrible injustice brought to light and put in the public domain with the drama 'Mr Bates versus The Post Office'. And even in our own lives things don't go according to plan and we can experience great suffering and confusion and sometimes we wonder where God is in all the darkness and mess and muddle.

So sometimes we have to be on the lookout for God's actions in our lives.

In those places where the Spirit of Christ has had the greatest influence, there has been a softening of justice. In those places where the Spirit of Christ has had the greatest influence, women enjoy freedom and respect. In those

places where the Spirit of Christ reigns, lives are changed, neighbourhoods are transformed – even whole nations become better. 'Heaven opened'! 'Angels ascending and descending'!

Just one example comes to mind – how after the terrible Grenfell fire, the first people who were there to help were the people of the local church. Evidently it only has a small congregation, but from the early hours of the night of the fire it became a centre of refuge and of volunteering and donations.

It's only the eyes of faith that can see the angels and the heavens. Nathanael had been a sceptic 'Can anything good come out of Nazareth?', but when he met Jesus he knew that he was known in his heart, and that he desired the good and Jesus blessed him for his willingness to see.

Like Samuel, we may hear a voice calling us. Do we block our ears and think that can't be for me, do we turn away, or do we dare to follow where we are being led?

Jesus hopes to bless us too. He asks only that we come and see – that we deal with him honestly – that we give him a chance – that we step out in faith. If we do that, he promises that we will see wondrous things. 'Heaven opened'! 'Angels ascending and descending'! And so, by the grace of God, we will. Amen

Saint's Day

1st February – Seiriol, saint of Puffin Island

You can find traces of old saints in most corners of the British Isles, but Seiriol is one of the only two saints connected to Anglesey, and certainly the ONLY saint connected to Puffin Island.

It was back in the 6th century that this gentle abbot first settled in Penmon, and built a little church. His ruined beehive cell still survives there today, as does the well from which he drew water, both for his own use, and also for baptising local people.


Like many other Celtic saints, Seiriol would have travelled by sea. So he felt comfortable near the coast on Anglesey, on low-lying land. Although he lived as a simple hermit, Seiriol soon attracted followers, and eventually he decided to establish a small monastery. He chose to build it on nearby Ynys Seiriol, now called Puffin Island.

That little monastery on Puffin Island saw some scary action in 632, when Edwin of Northumbria was chasing the Welsh king, Cadwallon, and ended up besieging him on the island. Cadwallon was finally conquered, and history moved on, but the monastic ruins of Seiriol's little monastery are still there today.

Seiriol seems to have been a purely local saint who never attracted a very great number of followers. The only known dedications to him are at Penmon and Puffin Island. But Seiriol's life and work are still a testimony today. He is a gentle and encouraging reminder of what an impact even a simple local Christian can achieve, by simply being faithful to Jesus Christ in the place where he is.



PCC news

PCC NOTES for the meeting on Wednesday 17th January 2024

Matters arising from previous minutes

BPC's use of data from the new CCTV system had been registered with the Information Commissioner's Office, making us fully compliant in our use of this form of data.

The work on the <u>Bell-tower</u> had been fully completed. New taps had been fitted in the Rooms toilets.

World Toilet Day. Donations of £465 <u>had</u> been received so far against a target of £480. BPC will be matched with toilets in Zimbabwe, Zambia, Nepal and Pakistan.

Financial statements and issues

'Housekeeping' figures to the end of November 2023 were reviewed. Income was £189,087 against a budget of £172,058. Fair Shares receipts showed a healthy increase following the stewardship campaign, and a Gift Aid claim for 2022 had yielded £11,329. Expenditure was £181,849 against a budget of £173,536. The main categories of over-spend were Church repairs and maintenance, reflecting major projects and the effects of damage during the year, and General Expenses, which included legal fees for the sale of the leases on Hammelton Road properties. Taken together these figures showed a surplus of £7,238 for the period against a budgeted deficit of £1,478. After payment of further commitments Becky expected BPC to end the year with a small surplus. In discussion it was confirmed that Hope Into Action had made the first rental payment on the Homesdale Road property. Interest income had increased following recent investment decisions, and it was agreed that £100,000 of BPC's cash reserves should be transferred to a Virgin Money account offering 4.5% interest.

Premises-related matters with financial implications

Members asked for confirmation (subsequently provided) that the work on the <u>Bell-tower</u> would be funded from legacies.

Lead theft and consequential damage. <u>Unfortunately</u> the insurance company were likely to reject BPC's claim as there was no evidence that the stolen lead was Smartwater marked. It was agreed that Marc Hare, who had carried out excellent repairs following the tree damage, would be asked to carry out the work now required, and that Ubiflex – a non-lead alternative – would be used to avoid the risk of further thefts.

Roof leak. A leak had been found in the tower, caused by cracks in the asphalt on the flat roof. It was agreed that the roof would be sealed by a liquid rubber product that could be walked on. Contractors would be asked to advise on the case for replacing the entire asphalt at this stage, although it was recognised that this would be a complex and expensive task.

Rochester Avenue property. The current tenants were planning to leave during the coming months, and did not want to renew on a fixed term lease. It was agreed that the lease would be renewed on a rolling basis, rather than two months' notice being given. This would give greater certainty to the tenants without being likely to disadvantage BPC income.

Water supply to boiler. Problems had been experienced recently, and an initial check at the junction with the street had failed to identify the cause. Some changes were being made at that point, and the situation would be monitored before deciding on next steps.

Wedding and funeral fees and Church hire charges

Tables showing current fees and statutory charges for 2024 imposed by the Diocese were reviewed. For those fees over which BPC had discretion, increases of £5 in wedding organist fees and £10 per pedestal for flowers were agreed. It was decided that fees for car parking supervision and verger support should be £40, and the charge for entry into the Church Book of Remembrance should be increased to £50, to offset current losses. Church and Rooms hire fees would remain unchanged for 2024, as many current hirers were struggling to meet existing charges.

APCM 2024

It was agreed that this year's APCM would be held on Sunday 12th May.

Any other business

Parking signs and feather flags. Designs were approved for signs to be placed near the church gate <u>and flags</u> near the church door to welcome visitors and show that specific activities were under way.

Prayers of Love and Faith. James reported that these had been commended by the C of E as resources to be used in praying with and for same-sex couples. Such use is at the discretion of vicars, and James indicated that he is ready to use the prayers if asked.

Bromley Veterans Athletic Club are planning to make a significant donation to the meals project run from BPC, as part of their charitable activities.

Bromley Homeless Starter Packs. Anne introduced the 2023 review of the project, which showed the steadily increasing number of packs produced each year, paralleled by rapidly growing demand. She said that she is planning to step back from the project during 2024. The meeting recognised that this raised major issues over its future management, operation and funding, which would need to be considered in detail.

World Day of Prayer is an international, inter-church organisation led by women which enables us to hear the thoughts of those women from all parts of the world: their hopes, concerns, and prayers. The preparation for the day is vast. An international committee is based in New York and there are national committees in each participating country. Regional conferences meet to consider the service and then local groups make their plans. Finally, at a church near you on Friday 1 March 2024 people will gather to celebrate the service prepared by the women of Palestine. The Day of Prayer is celebrated in over 146 countries. It begins in Samoa and prayer in native languages travels throughout the world - through Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Europe and the Americas before finishing in American Samoa some 38 hours later. 




A short story from the Bible
