

This sermon has been kindly provided by Rev James, from the dawn service on Easter Day.

One of my favourite moments of the year is the time before this service, when I am in church, pottering about as I set up. The church is in darkness, and I just sit for a while as the light starts to build towards dawn, as the birds begin to sing, it is incredibly peaceful and still with that frisson anticipation of all that is to come.

Yet those moments of stillness and peace bear no resemblance to that first Easter morning we see in our Gospel. There we have Mary Magdalene in turmoil at the trauma of Jesus' death and his hasty burial without proper preparation, hurrying to the tomb at first light to recover what she can of the situation by doing what she can to anoint the body. Only to see that the stone has moved, so she runs, runs back to tell to Peter and the disciple whom Jesus loved, who immediately run back to the tomb to see what is going on. Peter, who is likely a bit more middle aged, you can imagine puffing along behind the other younger disciple, but typically barrelling straight into the tomb to see what happened. Seeing the empty tomb they immediately set off to tell the others, leaving Mary overwhelmed by it all, in distress over what has happened to Jesus, until his voice cuts through it all.

The only still and peaceful place in the running about and high emotion is really the empty tomb, the place of death and nothingness, which this story is not about. One of the things to draw from this is that actually Easter happened amidst the chaos and rush of life, not removed from it. It is very easy to isolate Easter as a single special day, we have built up to it with a week of services, we have got up at an unreasonable hour to mark something special. And indeed it is important, but only if we see it connected to life as it goes on around us, because that it where its meaning and relevance is. It is in the

confusion of doubt and despair of the disciples that it happens, not removed from it, not delivered as a nice clearly written explanation they can sit down and discuss. It is there as part of life and everything else that happens in it.

If the peace before the service is one of my favourite times of year, then conversely one of my least is actually preparing the sermons for today. I think it is a pressure most preachers feel, and actually a lot of the time I think Easter sermons are not always the best. There is too much to do and often the temptation is to fit in close to 2000 years of theology, debate and pastoral practice, or to try and construct a logical case based on evidence, or generally do an awful lot in quite a small amount of space. And it doesn't always work.

What we see this morning in our reading is none of that, there is chaos and confusion – what is going on what does it all mean. Nothing is really explained, implications we know will take weeks to begin to be worked out as Jesus appears to his disciples and teaches them what is going on before his ascension, for the church more widely it will take centuries of vigorous and occasionally violent debate to hash out the basic language and concepts that are all foundational to how we understand and discuss faith. Even in the early church the process of learning about the faith was long – some suggest up to 3 years, others a mere lengthy series of talks before and after baptism. It takes time to work it all out and that is not what we see on that first morning.

What we have instead is scene of life in its confusions and its lows especially at this point, but cutting through that is just a glimmer of hope, that things can be different. In her distress Mary hears Jesus' voice, something she is attuned to – and in it the possibility of all changing, of longed for hopes resurrecting, of the pattern of pain and disappointment she has known being broken for ever. She might not understand quite what or how, but that sense at Jesus' voice of something else being possible is there and it is real, more real perhaps than the other things of her life.

Easter is not a static thing found in the silence of set days and elaborate ritual, rich and important as it is, we like Mary are commanded not to hold onto the moments but go and tell others about it. What do we communicate, what is it that draws people into thinking deeply about the things of God – it is that voice that cuts through the things of our lives, and says it can be different, it can be hopeful, that no matter what happens as life continues to buffet about through times of joy and sadness, that there is a hope which we can find and hold on to. That essence, that moment, that possibility – that is what happens this day by a tomb in Jerusalem, it is what happens for us here in suburban London, the world has been changed and we can change with it if we want to. The starting point for all journeys of faith and understanding, the rest can come later. The question for us, the question facing all people, is if we hear that voice of promise calling our name, are we willing to respond.

26th May: Ascension Day

Where did Jesus go at the Ascension?

In Salvador Dali's picture of Jesus' ascension all you can see are his feet! As we celebrate the event this month, it prompts the question 'where did Jesus go?' Peter says Jesus 'has gone into heaven and is at God's right hand' (1 Peter 3:22). However, the New Testament tells us three things about what Jesus is doing at the Father's side.

At Pentecost Peter said that Jesus is 'exalted to the right hand of God, He has received from the Father the promised Holy Spirit and has poured out what you now see and hear..."The Lord said to my Lord: 'Sit at my right hand" (Acts 2: 33-4). Peter is affirming Jesus' position of authority and power at the heart of the universe. By pouring out the gift of the Holy Spirit upon us, Jesus gives us a foretaste of the life of heaven ie eternal life, forgiveness, healing, release and God's provision for our lives.

When Stephen, the first Christian martyr, was being stoned to death by the Jewish authorities he points out, 'I see heaven open and the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God.' (Acts 7:56). Our experience of heaven is only ever partial, as we live with the reality of suffering and setbacks. However, Jesus is still on the throne! We are called to trust him daily.

The Bible also tells us that 'Christ Jesus who died....is interceding for us.' (Romans 8:34, cf Hebrews 7:25). Even when we don't know how to pray, we have the assurance that Jesus is already praying for us! He knows our needs even better than we do ourselves, so when we feel condemned or defeated in our Christian lives, we have somebody on our side!

The Ascension reminds us that the risen Jesus lives in the immediate presence of God, and both transcends and embraces our present experience. This truth lies at the heart of the *up* language used to describe the event.

'Heaven relates to earth tangentially so that the One who is in heaven can be present simultaneously anywhere and everywhere on earth: the ascension therefore means that Jesus is available, accessible, without people having to travel to a particular spot on the earth to find Him.' (Tom Wright).

From Hope into Action:

The purpose of this training is to equip and envision you to love and serve our tenants with the love and grace that Jesus has given to us. It is not a task to be taken on lightly as you will be building relationships with people who are struggling on the margins of society and may not have experienced love or community in this way before. You may encounter challenging behaviour from people who are often dealing with isolation, conflict, crime, abuse and/or substance misuse, but you may also have the privilege of seeing people changing, reconnecting with family members, getting jobs, learning to cook for the first time. It will be a roller coaster ride but as you persevere and keep looking to God and his strength, we pray that you will find the experience very rewarding and maybe even life-changing!

"Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up" Golations 6:9

Our heart is to give you some tools, knowledge and insight to help you connect with those you will be reaching, whilst also looking after yourself. Our prayer is that through our training and the accompanying manual: 'your love may abound more and more with knowledge and depth of insight' (Philippians 1:9).


