Bank Holiday Organ Recitals Monday 1st and 29th May 11.30am Ophelia Amara and Daniel Moult

There are two organ recitals taking place in May. The first is on Monday 1st and is being given by Ophelia Amar and the second is on Monday 29th when the organist is Daniel Moult.

Ophelia Amar is a French-British musician born in France. She is an active performer both in France and in London, having recently participated as a solo-performer in the "Bach the European" series with Rachel Podger, and as a recitalist for the concert series curated by the Eric Thompson Trust at Saint-Mary-le-Bow church. She also currently plays for services at Notre-Dame-de-France church in Leicester Square and Christ Church in Spitalfields. Ophelia started the organ in 2016 with Éric Lebrun and obtained her diploma at the Conservatoire à Rayonnement Régional de Saint-Maur-des-Fossés near Paris after a complete piano course with Christine Fonlupt at the same conservatoire. Before moving to the UK, she was a church organist in Créteil and at the Frederikskirken – the Danish Church in Paris. She is currently studying organ performance with David Titterington and choral conducting with Patrick Russill at the Royal Academy of Music in London, with support from the ABRSM and the Nicholas Danby Trust.

Daniel Moult heads the highly acclaimed organ department at the Royal Birmingham Conservatoire. As a soloist, he has performed in the UK, Europe, Asia and Australia. Quotes from reviews of his playing include "one of the finest organists of our time" (The Organ). Renowned for his virtuosic, intelligent and engaging performances, his musicianship has been praised as "exhilarating" (Gramophone), "dazzling" (The Organ), and "formidable" (Organists' Review). This will be Daniel's seventh visit to play here at St Peter and St Paul and I can guarantee that the recital will be well worth coming to.

Admission to both recitals is free with a retiring collection. They start at 11.30am with refreshments served from 10.30am. Hope to see you there!

The Saturday morning concert this month on 13th May at 11.30am is being given by the Canadian born soprano Darquise Bilodeau.

Darquise combines professional performing experience with research and voice pedagogy. She is a graduate of McGill University, with a B.Mus. in voice performance and school music, and of the Université de Montréal with a Master's Degree in voice performance. Darquise values ongoing professional development and regularly attends conferences and workshops on voice pedagogy, anatomy and interpretation. She was a chorus member of the Opéra de Montréal and performs regularly as a recitalist and soloist in oratorio.

Darquise earned a doctorate with her thesis on the songs of French composer Gabriel Fauré at the Birmingham Royal Conservatoire. She has a keen interest in French song and its poetry and continues her research on the subject. She writes articles and book reviews for the Association of Teachers of Singing.

Darquise's accompanist is pianist and concert producer Marc Verter.

Saint's Day

May 2023

1st May: James the Less, quiet son of Alphaeus

One thing for sure: the apostles were not self-obsessed. In fact, many a church historian has wished that they had left us just a few more personal details about themselves in the New Testament. James the Less is an excellent example.

This is the name we give to James the son of Alphaeus, but beyond that, who was he? Sometimes he is identified as the James whose mother stood by Christ on the cross. Sometimes he is thought to be the James who was 'brother of the Lord'. Sometimes he is thought to be the James who saw the risen Christ. He has also, and often, been called the first bishop of Jerusalem. And finally, sometimes James the Less has been thought of as the author of the Epistle of James.

But who really knows? If none of these identifications are correct, we know practically nothing about James the Less. So perhaps on this day we can simply recall 'all' of the James' above, and thank God for the mother who stood by the cross, the brother that supported Jesus, the apostle who saw his risen Lord and gave his life to proclaiming the truth, the first bishop of Jerusalem, and the author of the marvellous Epistle of James. Whether it was one James or several, they were all faithful to Jesus, and proclaimed Him as the Messiah. So perhaps that should make them James the More!

James the Less has been given an unusual iconographic emblem: a fuller's club. Tradition has it that he was beaten to death with one, after being sentenced by the Sanhedrin in AD62. In England there are only 26 churches which are dedicated to James the Less.

Bromley Meals Project

Thank you to Helen for this introduction to the Bromley Meals Project which is doing incredible work for school-aged children.

Did you know that 1 in 4 children in Bromley live in poverty?

To be hungry as a child means your tummy hurts, which means you can't focus on your lessons at school, or your body isn't healthy enough to fight off illness, or you shiver a lot because you are cold, or you feel embarrassed when your friends snack or talk about dinner. And whatever the reason your family is struggling, when you are 6, there is not much you can do about it. That's why the help has to be ready, and in place for the precise moment that someone finds out that you need help.

Bromley Meals is a project run from Ss. Peter & Paul which aims help by providing meals boxes for distribution in schools, children's centres and community hubs. As soon as a teacher or other professional realises that a child will not eat dinner that night, they can invite a family to choose from a selection of delicious dinner options. And if they need dinner again tomorrow night, they can...because no child should have to go to bed hungry.

Even though we might think of Bromley as an affluent place, it is a sad reality that many families in our community live in poverty. Did you know that 27% of children were living in poverty in Bromley and Chislehurst in 2019-20? That is 5,577 children. And that's just one part of our borough. This is a situation which continues to be worsened by the cost-of-living crisis. We seek to address this by providing boxes containing simple, nutritious meals for children and their families.

Through donations we buy basic, tinned ingredients to assemble 5 different meals boxes — 'Cool Kids Curry', 'Tastetastic Tacos', 'Brilliant Bolognese' and 'Terrific Tuna Pasta', plus one which only requires a kettle to make food. Everything needed for dinner is in the box, including a recipe card with straightforward instructions and games and puzzles for kids to play. To make sure that the meals are available to any child, we have made sure that there are options for children who are vegetarian, or gluten free.

These boxes are delivered to local schools, where they are given out to children or families in need. This helps to ensure that children who may not have access to regular meals at home are still able to receive the nutrition they

need to grow and thrive. Currently we are working with 4 schools locally - since November we have sent 263 boxes – providing 1052 meals to those who would go without otherwise.

A very sincere thank you to everyone who has supported us so far. We continue to need support as we look to expand to other schools, children's centres and community hubs locally to ensure more children do not go to bed hungry in our community. Donations of money for items are welcome via our website (mealsnetwork.org/bromley), if you are able to help occasionally pack and deliver boxes, we would be delighted to hear from you. Also, if you happen to have a co-op membership, Bromley meals is one of the causes you can support with your purchases until October.

The puppets are accompanied by people of all ages dressed as lions, Roman soldiers, angels, chariots and more, resulting in a stunning spectacle of colour and celebration.

Meet King Henry VIII and Anne Boleyn and try your hand at playing Tudor games with re-enactment group Tudor Legacies. 12noon | Medieval Festival on the Orchard




5pm | Pilgrimage Evensong, This service ends with a procession to the shrine of St Alban, where red roses are placed on the shrine in an act of celebration.
