

Thank you to Mike for kindly sharing his sermon from Compline on 15 October.

TEXTS:

Old Testament: Isaiah 43.1-7

Fans of James Bond may remember a scene from the film "Skyfall" when secret agent James Bond, played by Daniel Craig, meets his new Quarter Master, "Q", played by Ben Wishaw, at the National Gallery in London. They are sitting before the "Fighting Temeraire", the painting by JMW Turner. Q opens the conversation by saying, "It almost makes me a little melancholy, a grand old warship being ignominiously hauled away for scrap. The inevitability of time, don't you think?" The sub-text is whether there is a place any more in the British Secret Service for an ageing secret agent in the field, when so much damage can be done on-line – "first thing in the morning in my pyjamas before my first cup of Earl Grey", as Q indelicately puts it.

That is the essence or meaning of this much-loved painting – the indignity of old age when something that once had a glorious history is, without ceremony or fanfare, towed away by a paddle steamer for scrap in 1838, the same year that the painting was completed. The ship was one of the last of the ships of the line to have been involved in the great victory at the Battle of Trafalgar, and its last voyage attracted substantial press coverage. Turner was a master painter of seascapes, capturing weather, sea and light.

One of the first things that strikes you is that the subject of the painting, the old warship, is to the left of the painting, not in the centre. The painting has been much analysed, but in a nutshell there is the sun setting on the age of sail as the brave new world of steam dawns – the "Fighting Temeraire" and other sailing vessels appearing almost ghostly, whilst the paddle steamer pulling, and the other tugboat on its way towards it, appear dirty, blackened and churning the calm waters. Change is coming, and it's not always welcome.

Change happens. Sometimes for the better. Sometimes for the worse. Often it is inevitable. Whenever it happens it can be difficult, painful, traumatic and final for those involved or otherwise caught up in it.

Whilst the obvious conclusion might be the results of aging, the decline and obsolescence this might bring, there are numerous other examples where this might be the case. At the end of this talk there will be a moment to reflect upon what it might mean for you. But think of other examples where you may no longer feel wanted or valued – children given up for adoption, children leaving home, divorce or the breakdown of a relationship; redundancy, retirement; or facing the ravages of injury or illness, both your own or to those you love; or coping with bereavement.

And it's not just at the personal level, there can be broader changes such as Turner was reflecting, here those brought about by the industrial revolution. Perhaps you might see in the painting a reflection of the demise of religion in general, or the Church of England in particular. The grandeur of church worship and faith being towed away – other cherished beliefs and practices being scrapped in favour of other ways of life or doing things, or of other beliefs – or a move to secularism in general.

Change happens. Sometimes for the better. Sometimes for the worse. Often it is inevitable. Whenever it happens it can be difficult, painful, traumatic and final for those involved or otherwise caught up in it. I choose this painting and this passage from Isaiah because it is easy to feel alone, abandoned, unsure of what to do, resigned to your fate.

But think for a moment about the "Fighting Temeraire" – even if in this case being towed away for scrap, if it really is the end, realise that it still had a glorious past, was home to many who lived and fought on it, was part of a larger fleet. It was not alone. If it is the right thing to do, accept the change, take pride in who or what it stands for and bask in the love of those who will miss

it. And the same applies to us as individuals or the groups or institutions which we cherish.

There is another way to look at it where that change may be something positive, a challenge: embrace it, adapt and be part of the future.

However you see it, you are not alone. The passage from Isaiah came at a difficult time for Jacob and for Israel. But God was able to reassure, to comfort and to strengthen them. Just to pick out some of the themes as God says:

I created you and I formed you;

Do not fear, for I have redeemed you;

I have called you by name, you are mine;

When you pass through the waters, I will be with you;

The rivers shall not overwhelm you;

The flame shall not consume you;

You are precious in my sight, honoured, and I love you;

Do not fear, for I am with you;

Everyone who is called by my name, whom I created for my glory, whom I formed and made.

So powerful are the verses that they have been adapted as one of the responses in the service of Morning Prayer.

A final thought. If you park Turner's presentation of the paddle steamer as something dirty, focus instead on the fact that this seemingly small craft is able to pull, lead, guide and protect a much larger craft. We are taught about a powerful God whose magnificence and glory are beyond our imagination, but remember that he chose to reveal himself to us on earth in human form

through his Son, Jesus Christ. And that revelation is celebrated in 2 of the Church's major festivals as something that, from first sight at least, appears less than powerful – the birth of the baby Jesus at Christmas, vulnerable and dependent upon his parents, as any baby is; and the death of Jesus on a cross on Good Friday, in agony, alone and seemingly defeated. Yet through these deceptively small and weak acts, the Christian faith was born and grew, the hidden power of the incarnation and the resurrection evidence that God will always be with us and will lead us, and that through Him we shall be saved.

Fear not, for I have redeemed you. I have called you by name; you are mine.

16th November St Margaret of Scotland

the **KEY**

Some women have power, and some women are good. When a woman with power is also good, she can achieve an astonishing amount.

Margaret of Scotland has been called 'The Pearl of Scotland', but she began life in Hungary about 1045. She was born to the expatriate English prince Edward the Exile, and so was an English princess. The family returned to Wessex in 1057, when she was 13, and following the death of King Harold II at the Battle of Hastings in 1066, her brother Edgar Aetheling should have been King of England, but he was never crowned. Instead, the family fled north, to Scotland, where she was married to Malcolm III of Scotland by 1070. As a Scottish queen she went on to become mother of three kings of Scotland, and of a queen consort of England.

Margaret was a Christian, and became a good friend of Lanfranc, a future archbishop of Canterbury. Her biographer tells of how she read narratives from the Bible to her husband, thus helping to 'civilise' him. He was illiterate, but so admired her reading, that he had her books decorated with gold and silver. She was also credited with helping her youngest son, the future King David I of Scotland, towards becoming a just and holy ruler.

Margaret introduced the worship and practise of the Church of Rome into Scotland. She also wanted to help the many pilgrims travelling in Scotland, and so she established a ferry across the Firth of Forth, which is where the towns South Queensferry and North Queensferry got their names.

Margaret performed many charitable works for the poor, and she interceded for the release of English exiles who had been forced into serfdom following the Norman conquest. She also began the restoration of Iona Abbey.

In private life, Margaret spent much of her time in prayer, using a cave on the banks of the Tower Burn in Dunfermline as a place of devotion and prayers. St Margaret's Cave is still there today, covered beneath a municipal car park.

Margaret died in 1093, and in 1250 Pope Innocent IV canonised her. Her relics were dispersed after the Scottish Reformation, but at one time Mary, Queen of Scots, owned her head.

We have decided that the group has reached a natural end and should like to thank Christine for her leadership over several years.


